# RECAP OF MEETINGS YOU MIGHT HAVE MISSED:

**JANUARY**—The Candor Historical Society had planned a tour of Candor Central High School, but due to the weather conditions it was cancelled and will be rescheduled at a later date.

**FEBRUARY**—A roundtable on the Memories of Marion Kelsey, a Candor resident from 1893—1985, was held at the Candor Town Hall.

MARCH—Dr. Jonathan Zisk, one of Candor High School's Envirothon advisors, was our guest speaker. Candor High School has participated in the Envirothon for many years, consistently winning at the County and often the Regional levels, then to the State level where they won nine times, more than any other school in New York State. After

winning at the State level the students have gone on to participate in the National competition. The Envirothon program was designed to be a hands-on outdoor competition for high school students to encourage them to become interested in natural resource conservation and environmental issues.

APRIL—Guest speakers Skip and Jeanne Jackson gave a talk on the history of the Iron Kettle Farm from the beginning in 1969 to the present—and what's next.

Celebrating their 50th year in business, the talk highlighted their ups and downs, their growth, major changes, partnerships with their children, awards, and everything in between. The Iron Kettle Farm, also sometimes referred to as the Pumpkin Farm, is one of Candor's major agro-tourism businesses that draws thousands during the peak season.

MAY—Guest speaker Steven Lindridge, a Technical Education Teacher at Candor High School for the past 26-27 years, opened his classrooms/shop at the school and gave a tour of his facilities. Lindridge was named New York State Technology Education and Engineering Association Teacher of the Year in 2015, the Technology & Engineering Teacher Excel-

lence Award in 2016, and the Masonic General Douglas A. MacArthur Youth Award in 2017.



JUNE—The Candor Historical Society held their Annual Business Meeting/open house at the Candor History Center. It was officially the first meeting to be held at the Center. At the conclusion of the business meeting, Eleanor Hurd gave an overview of what resources are available at the Center. Afterwards, attendees where invited to check out the various collections. # Candor 75 Years Ago— 1944, by Don Weber (Based on the Candor Courier Items)

- Donald Strong, 4, and his 3-year old sister, Jean Strong (Ahart), followed their dog onto the ice of the "upper" millpond where Donald Fell through. Little Jean held his hands and kept his head above water until their cries were heard by nearby youths who alerted George Leonard Sr., who crawled out on the ice and rescued Don. Jean was nominated by the Binghamton Press for the Carnegie Medal for bravery and the Endicott Order of Eagles awarded her a \$25, War Bond.
- Candor was one of four towns in the County to raise their National War Fund goal of \$1600, and went over the \$26,600, quota set for it in the Fourth War Loan Drive with \$26,874.
- ♦ Boy Scout Troop 42 collected 5600 pounds of scrap paper. Later nine Scouts attended the Annual Camporee Weekend at Camp Barton on Cayuga Lake.
- ◆ T.H. Kuykendall affiliated with the Independent Grocers Association (I.G.A) and instituted self-service and grocery carts—"baby carriages" as Courier Editor Art Beebe called them. (In 1945, T.H.K. was joined by Ray Cochran in converting Candor Hall-82 Main Str.—into a super market/appliance store.)
- In a unique arrangement (that would continue for 7 years) the Congregational Church and St. Marks Episcopal Church unified, with Ref. Charles Sykes ministering to both.
- ♦ The Edward Wands house (11 Spencer St.—apartments) was purchased by Mr. & Mrs. David Doane and Nurse Mrs. Richard Carlsen, and converted into a nursing home.
- ♦ Hardware merchant D.G. LaGrange was finally able to get in a railcar of barbed wire, wove-wire field fencing, staples and nails.
- ♦ The Masonic and Eastern Star Lodges took over rooms above the I.G.A. vacated by the Odd Fellows and Rebeccahs who moved to rooms above Robinson's General Store (across from Quick's Laundromat).
- The Tioga County Clerk sat at Miller's Store (80 Main St.) to sell and renew auto licenses. About 150 took advantage of the" courtesy", which was also designed to save gasoline.
- ♦ The Claude Butterfields received many phone calls, letters and cards from people in Western States and Canada after a recording made by their Japanese P.O.W. son, G. Bronson Butterfield, was broadcast from Tokyo (probably by "Tokyo Rose").
- The Ground Observers Corps of the Air Corps closed the local Lookout Posts and gave out awards to the observers.
